- Student to faculty ratio: 7:1

- Cross-registration at MIT, Brandeis, Babson, Olin College of Engineering, as well as Twelve College Exchange
- Certificate of Engineering and Certificate of Sustainability through cross-registration with Babson/Olin
- 74% of students participate in paid and unpaid internships; 20% abroad
- Over 50% of students study abroad in 150+ study-abroad programs



Wellesley students enjoy some of the finest facilities (such as Whitin Observatory above) and equipment available to science undergraduates anywhere in the nation. Extensive student research offers a huge head start for students who go on to graduate school.

Outcomes

- 80+% acceptance rate to law schools
- 70+% acceptance rate to schools in medical professions in recent years
- 70+% accepted at their first choice graduate institution
- 80% of our alumnae attend graduate or professional schools within 10 years of graduation, often in traditionally male-dominated fields (economics, computer science, physics), often at top-ranked programs with full funding
- Ranked among top U.S. baccalaureate colleges in producing highest number of doctoral recipients in the physical sciences
- Excellence consistently recognized in graduate grants and fellowships
- 200+ top business and non-profits recruit on campus each year
- Among top employers hiring Wellesley alumnae: Bank of America Merrill Lynch, Dana Farber Cancer Institute, Microsoft

Admission

- Common Application accepted (free); Coalition Application available 2017-18
- Deadlines: Early Decision I (Nov. 1); Early Evaluation (Dec. 15); Early Decision II (Jan. 1); Regular Decision (Jan. 15)
- Required tests: either SAT I and two subject tests or ACT with writing
- TOEFL recommended for students from non-English-based high-school curricula
- * Wellesley grants credit for A-levels, AP, and IB higher-level exams

Financial Aid

- Wellesley meets 100% of demonstrated financial need for all admitted students
- Admission is need-sensitive for international citizens; thus highly competitive for international citizens applying for aid
- * Average annual package for international students receiving financial aid: \$55,000.
- Financial aid is portable to 150+ approved study-abroad programs
